Algebra 1-2



Algebra 1-2

In Algebra 1-2, students wrapped up the semester by preparing for our unit 4 assessment on equations and inequalities. Through this, students persevere and consistently learn from their mistakes. In our classrooms, students are mathematicians and share their learning supported by vocabulary. Day by day, students sharpen their skills as critical thinkers and make connections.

English Language Arts 1-2

ELA 1-2 classes reviewed reading literature standards, enhancing their skills at analyzing characterization, theme, and symbolism. Students completed various novel studies this quarter, including independent choice novels, *The Alchemist, Circe, A Wrinkle in Time, Tuesdays with Morrie, The Odyssey* and Norse Myths. They also demonstrated their proficiency of writing standards by completing an informative essay discussing the values and challenges of personal independence. This timed writing exercise is a district assessment designed to prepare 9th graders to succeed on the ACT-Aspire exam in April.









Characterization


Characterization is the description of a character's physical traits (how a character looks), point of view, personality, private thoughts, and actions.

Symbolism

A symbol is the use of a concrete object to represent an abstract idea. The term symbol, when used in literature is often a figure of speech in which a person, object, or situation represent something in addition to its literal meaning.



Science

Biology will be jumping into topics such as diseases, mitosis and meiosis, DNA replication, inheritance and human impacts. 2nd semester we will be learning about everyday issues that students may have seen in their life.




Social Studies

World History Honors students learned about the causes and effects of major revolutions between the 17th and 19th centuries: the English Revolution, French Revolution, Haitian Revolution, revolutions throughout Latin America, and ending with the Industrial Revolution.

To demonstrate mastery of these concepts, students completed two major projects. In the first project, students worked together to create a newscast video that was set in an assigned

revolution. These videos included interviews, news stories, and commercials that allowed them to think critically and communicate as a person would have in this time. Students ended first semester by presenting a Shark Tank-style pitch for a chosen invention from the Industrial Revolution.



Health and Physical Education Department

The Health students spent the last 7 weeks working with our School Resource Officer, Officer Rhodes on Aggression and Hostility. The lessons were wrapped up with a special guest speaker about "choices". Students learned that every moment we have the ability to choose what we say and how we act; "guard your words and actions!"



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Career Technical Education Department

CTE students are learning professional skills for their future careers through hands on learning!

Software Development

During the second quarter, Software Development students worked on HTML and learning to code and design a website. All students are currently building their own functional website.


Sports Medicine

Sports Medicine students have learned all about the major muscles and bones in the human body, medical terminology, how the body responds to injury, and are currently wrapping up their unit on environmental conditions! We are so excited to get more work based learning in our new lab space next semester!



World Languages Department

This quarter students learned to conjugate the verbs in present tense. They learned about the different places in the city and modes of transportation including the verbs for to go, to have, and to like.



Fine Arts Department

Visual Arts

This semester was filled with vocabulary on elements or art, principals of design, drawing, collage and painting. Students practiced value and proportions. In the drawing center they experimented with pencil, pen, oil pastel, chalk pastel, charcoal, color pencils, markers, and drawing pencils. In collaging, they experimented with tissue paper, scrap booking, cubomania and story telling. In painting we have experimented with color mixing and color schemes using water color and tempera paint. They have created art with paper mache doing a sculpture made from trash. They created portraits using pencil then collage for background. They also created Portfolio Websites that has all their art and statements about their art on them to share with friends and family.

Ceramics

Ceramics - Students learned different hand-building techniques with clay to make pumpkin luminaries and coil pots. They also learned the major differences and properties of glaze versus acrylic and how to effectively paint their projects with the medium of their choice.



Tutoring

We have started offering FREE after school math tutoring in the BGHS Library a few days per week. Parenting Tips - Academic Support Team

Have a set up place and time for students to do homework each and every night. If your student says they do not have homework, ask to see their notes and classwork. There are always things they can study or problems they can rework for extra practice. And just like in lower grades, students should be reading for at least 20 minutes per day and practicing math fluency daily also (quiz them on multiplication facts verbally while driving or check out webmathminute.com where they can practice online.)
