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
Arrival 8:30AM

- School starts at 8:45AM with drop off beginning at 8:30AM. There is no campus supervision before this time.
- Upon arrival, students will need to go directly to the playground. First and second grade students will be on the playground in the morning.

Dismissal 3:30PM

Teachers will accompany students as needed at dismissal. If your child's method of transportation changes, please let us know right away by email or call the front office after 2:30PM. First graders are not permitted to leave campus without a parent or older sibling.

- **Car Riders-** Carline parent pick up will be at the front of the school for grades 1st- 8th. First graders will be waiting on the blue Bobcat paws for those parents that wish to <u>stay in their cars and drive through.</u>
- Walkers-Walkers will be dismissed at the bus gates.
 - Student Walkers = Parents will park in the parking lot next to the bus area and <u>walk up</u> to the "Walkers" gate to pick up their child if they do not want to drive through the carline.

Bus Riders

If your child rides the school bus, they will need to know their bus number and bus stop before the first day of school.

- <u>Please</u> practice going on the bus route with your child so they are familiar with their designated route and are familiar with their bus stop.
- This is VERY important for the safety of your child because the bus makes several stops! We do not want your child getting off at the wrong bus stop.

Daily Star Folders/Bobcat Planners

STAR folders will be used as a communication tool between school and home daily. It will hold classwork, homework and important notices. Each student will color what behavior color he or she ended the day on in their Bobcat Planners. Please check and initial each calendar day. Feel free to write a note in your child's planner as we will be checking it daily during our morning routine.

Homework

Homework will begin once classroom routines have been established. Homework directions will be posted in our weekly Smores digital newsletters.

Reading Homework - Reading practice at home is essential for your child's reading progress in first grade.

- <u>Sight Words</u>: Please have your child practice reading the sight words that are sent home. Students will be assessed after each reading unit. Students can cut the words into flashcards and should work on five words at a time. Gradually add a word as your child masters sight words already introduced. Review sight words already taught with your child to ensure reading success!
- <u>Daily Reading</u>: Students will need to read 15-20 minutes each day to an adult. Students can read the paper phonics story that is sent home for their daily reading or a book/chapter of their choice. It's a good idea to take turns while reading. Reading is an excellent time for

parents to spend time with their children. Sometimes you read to your child to model fluency and other times your child needs to read to you to build fluency.



Math Homework

- Students will need to complete any math pages sent home labeled as "Homework."
- Math homework sheets will be sent home daily except on testing days.
- Math homework must be turned in daily to help with review.

Birthdays



Students may bring in store bought birthday treats and napkins. Treats such as cookies, Rice Krispie treats, fruit snacks, brownie bites, or mini cupcakes are perfect. Less mess is best! No large cakes please. Students can also bring in other things to share such

as a donated classroom book, stickers, pencils, erasers, book marks, etc... Those students with a summer birthday will be able to bring in items when they are Bobcat of the Week. Bobcat of the Week



Every student will be chosen as "Bobcat of the Week" at some point during the school year. Your child's special week will be as close to the week of their birthday as possible. Directions will be

sent home along with a scrapbook to be completed before your child's week. Students will also be able to share one special item each day of their week.

Classroom Volunteers

Deer Valley Unified School District requires all school volunteers and field trip chaperones to take the DVUSD volunteer training course offered throughout the year. For new volunteers to DVUSD, please refer to the volunteer training dates and locations <u>HERE</u>. You may go to any DVUSD training location to complete the training. If you have taken this training in previous years, you are all set.

We are fortunate to have a tremendous parental support base at our school. Our classroom volunteer program will begin once classroom routines have been established. Some requests to come weekly will not be met due to the volume of parent responses and class availability.

Field Trips

Field trips will cost a small amount depending upon transportation costs and entry fees to the venue. All DVUSD field trip chaperones will be required to ride the school bus to and from the destination. A volunteer lottery system will take place if more volunteers apply than needed. Field trip chaperones will need to have already completed the DVUSD volunteer training prior.

English Language Arts Curriculum HMH Into Reading

ELA Parent Resource

DVUSD utilizes the Houghton Mifflin Harcourt Into Reading program. HMH Into Reading is differentiated by design to offer a balanced approach to literacy instruction.



Our HMH reading and spelling program follows a six day cycle with days 1-5 direct teaching and day 6 for assessment. Therefore, our curriculum does not follow a traditional Monday-Friday cycle. Spelling and reading tests will take place on day 6 of each cycle.

Daily 5 Literacy Centers

The Daily Five is a research-based method of structuring the reading block so every student is independently engaged in meaningful literacy tasks with emphasis on the Six Syllable Types. These tasks focus on those skills that will have the biggest impact on student reading and writing achievement, as well as fostering children who love to read and write. Students receive daily small and whole group instruction as well as independent practice time to read and write.

1. Teacher Time: Small Reading Groups

While the students are at their literacy centers, teachers run leveled small reading groups. Within small groups, teachers will meet with up to six students at a time to work on the five areas of reading: phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. These leveled reading groups help provide a more individualized instruction to help meet the needs of all students. Teachers will also be meeting with

students individually as needed.

2. Read to Self

The best way for children to become better readers is by practicing reading each day with books the students choose that are a "Good Fit." These books may include books from the class library, textbook stories, or poetry. Students will be able to read books independently or with a friend. Partner reading allows for more time to practice strategies, helping to build fluency, check for understanding, hear their own voice, and time to share in this learning community.

3. Word Work

Expanded vocabulary and correct phonetic spelling allow for more fluent reading and writing. Thus, speeding up the ability to comprehend what is read and get thinking down on paper. Students will use this time to work on a word sort with our weekly phonics/spelling skill.

4. Work on Writing

Just like reading, the best way to become a better writer is by practicing writing each day. Students will create a monthly writing journal consisting of their own and teacher generated writing pieces.

5. Centers

Hearing good examples of literature and fluent reading expands vocabulary, builds stamina, and helps students become better readers. Students will be able to listen to age appropriate books on CD or ChromeBooks.

Spelling Into Reading Word Sorts

Deer Valley has transitioned from traditional spelling instruction to a word study approach. Using Into Reading word work activities, students develop knowledge of English spelling and learn how to examine words through active exploration using a hands-on manipulative approach. During word study, students discover generalizations about spelling using Six Syllable


Types direct instruction of vowel patterns, instead of just memorizing spelling rules.

Spelling Dictation Tests

At the end of each spelling cycle, selected sentence dictation by the teacher will be given as a written test. Students will be given multiple opportunities to practice their words in class and at home. Spelling tests will take place on Day 6 of each cycle.

Writing

The Into Reading writing program is a developmental program that teaches students weekly grammar lessons, the five-step writing process (Prewrite, Draft, Revise, Edit, and Publish), and the additional use of Thinking Maps to create structured, meaningful pieces of writing.



Thinking Maps allow students to visualize and organize their thinking based on the fundamental thought process needed to complete the writing process. The writing genres that will be taught are narrative, informational text, poetry, and opinion.

Eureka Math

Math Parent Resource

Eureka Math is a rigorous program aligned to the state standards that upholds the balance between procedural fluency and conceptual understanding. Module Topics:



- Operations and Algebraic Thinking
- Number and Operations in Base Ten
- Measurement and Data
- Geometry
- Money

Math newsletters/parent tips will be sent home for each module. Math tests,

quizzes, and math fluency will take place every few weeks depending on the length of each unit. Math tests may consist of a pre, mid, and final test at the end of each unit.

Science



Science Parent Resource

A combination of materials has been curated to support the curriculum for our K-2 learners with programs including: Mystery Science, Picture Perfect and some Open Education resources. The following units will be covered: light and sound, forces and motion, habitats, and life cycles. In addition, we will explore areas of the inquiry process, life science, physical science, and Earth science.

- Use the scientific inquiry process.
- Identify and compare the basic structures, life cycles and habitats of plants and animals.
- Classify objects and materials by their observable properties.
- Demonstrate the various ways that objects can move.
- Identify the basic properties of Earth materials, natural resources and conservation methods.
- Identify objects in the sky and weather patterns.

Social Studies

Social Studies Parent Resource

DVUSD utilizes the newly adopted 2023 Arizona edition social studies program from McGraw Hill. Students will be learning about the following units of study:



- Describe past events, people, and places using maps, timelines and primary resource materials.
- Recognize the settlement and development of early civilizations
- Recognize American symbols, monuments, customs, holidays, and traditions.
- Recognize Arizona symbols and statehood.
- Identify examples of rights, responsibilities, and citizenship in stories

- past and present.
- Recognize basic economic principles.

Assessments

DIBELS 8th Edition (Grades K-3)

All kindergarten through third grade DVUSD students are assessed using the DIBELS 8th Edition screener in August, December and May. Test results will be sent home to parents and discussed during parent-teacher conferences.

The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) 8th Edition are a set of procedures and measures for assessing the acquisition of early literacy skills from K-8. They are designed to be short (one minute) fluency measures used to regularly monitor the development of early literacy and early reading skills.

DIBELS 8th Edition consists of six measures to function as indicators of phonemic awareness, alphabetic principle, accuracy and fluency with connected text, and reading comprehension.

Diagnostic Reading Assessment (DRA2)

The DRA2 (Developmental Reading Assessment 2) is a reading assessment that is used to determine the independent and instructional reading level of students. This assessment is administered one on one by the teacher and/or reading specialist. The DRA2 Benchmark Assessment measures each student's reading proficiency through systematic observation, recording, and evaluation of comprehension performance.

DVUSD Mathematics and Reading Assessments

K-2 teachers administer district interim assessments two times per year (Mid and Post)

First Grade Test Retake Policy

Parents may request in writing for their child to retake a test in which he or she has received a score of 57% or below. Our retake policy does <u>NOT</u> apply to quizzes and any district required testing. Tests only. Retakes will be completed in class.

Grading and Report Cards


Parent Grading Resource

Students in Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grades will receive marks for their proficiency towards the grade level standards using the following scale.

K-2 Standards Grading Scale

- 4 = Applies grade level skills with greater depth and complexity.
- 3 = Demonstrates grade level proficiency.
- 2 = Approaches grade level proficiency.
- 1 = Displays a significant lack of grade level proficiency.

Academic Subject Grades



Students in 1st and 2nd grades will receive marks for their overall performance in each course of study using the following letter grade scale. Overall course grades for students in 1st and 2nd grades will be determined by the average of all overall standards scores for the grading period. The average will be converted to a letter grade of E, S, N, or U.

E = Excellent (80%-100%)

S = Satisfactory (60%-79%)

N = Needs Improvement (42%-59%)

U = Under Performing (0%-41%)

Report cards will no longer be printed for grades 1-8, but instead will be viewed online using your parent Power School account . If you need access to Power School, please contact the front office. Only fourth quarter report cards will be printed at this time.
